Lawyer-musicians plan concert benefit for heart research

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Less than a week after Christina S. Ballester's son Alexander was born, he underwent surgery to repair a congenital heart defect.

Ballester's experience with Alexander, now 3 years old and healthy, has motivated her to organize a concert on April 14 in Wilmette benefiting the Children's Health Foundation, Illinois chapter.

"I was very fortunate that they found it early before he was born," said Ballester, a senior care claims counsel with Medpro Group, a healthcare liability insurance company. "It's really an important cause that I don't think gets enough awareness."

The show begins at 7 p.m. at the Rockhouse Cafe, 1150 Central Ave. All proceeds will go to the children's foundation.

Congenital heart defects are the most common birth defect affecting roughly 40,000 babies born in the U.S. each year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Congenital heart defects alter the structure of a baby's heart and how blood flows to the rest of the body, according to the CDC. In some cases, congenital heart defects result in a small hole in the heart. More severe forms of the condition lead to missing or poorly formed parts of the heart.

Ballester said the idea for the benefit concert formed after she and Thomas R. Mulroy III teamed up to create a band, Ex Cathedra, late last year.

"I told him that I felt like what we were doing was so awesome and that ... if we could do it to raise money for an important cause it would make it that much more fruitful — it would feel so much more fulfilling," she said.

Mulroy is a partner at Salvi, Schostok & Pritchard P.C., joining the plaintiff firm in January after 19 years at Hinshaw & Culbertson LLP.

"We thought the most fun way we could try to give back would be to put on a show and donate all the proceeds to that organization," he said.

She said the purpose of the benefit concert is more than just fundraising. The other reason is "to raise awareness to people of that fact that this can happen, but it's not a death sentence, and that there are wonderful people out there to help families through it."

Ballester said Alexander will attend part of the event.

"I think it's good to have a face assigned to the cause," she said. Though doctors continue to monitor Alexander, she said he has not faced any residual problems.

"Being a lawyer and being as prepared as you are to walk in court and argue a motion could never ever prepare you as a mother to walk into the hospital to deliver a child that you know is going to have to under-
