

Hinsdale plaintiff attorney strides to make difference in people's lives

"Whether it's the death of a child, the death of a spouse, paralysis; there are so many things that have really touched me and impacted me," Kroll said.

Kroll has joined Salvi, Schostok & Pritchard P.C. after having his own practice and working with Chicago's Clifford Law Offices. He was the youngest personal injury lawyer selected for inclusion in The Best Lawyers of America 2011, 2012 and 2013.

The Hinsdale resident has been practicing law for years, focusing in the areas of medical malpractice, personal injury and wrongful death cases.

Kroll isn't representing corporations or entities, but individuals. As a result, he gets to know families quite well and becomes a bigger part of their lives besides just having the attorney-client relationship
